HPCA June 2017 Meeting Minutes

The June Hyde Park Civic

Association general meeting was held on Monday, June 5th, at Rudyard's Pub. **President Macy Bodenhamer**

opened the meeting at 6:40pm with approximately 17 people in attendance. Bodenhamer introduced herself and other board members. June's HPD guest speaker canceled due to family issues but **Officer Alms** came at the last minute to address the audience.

After Officer Alms spoke, Bodenhamer continued to lead the meeting with the regular business agenda.

Treasurer Veronica Faubert

presented the Treasurer's report. The May balance opened at \$19,871.14 and closed at \$20,476.21. Revenue consisted of advertising and membership income and expenses included regular monthly fees for Lamar Park maintenance. Extraordinary items included incoming \$1,189 PayPal membership transfer, \$262 expense reimbursement and \$94 annual mailbox rental fee.

Bodenhamer gave a brief membership update, stating the association had just reached over 180 members. She then announced the three vacant volunteer positions.* The board is in need of a secretary. The voting position requires six hours commitment per month. The second position is a coordinator for the neighborhood watch program that reports hours paroled each month.

*At the time of going to print, new volunteers have been appointed for the citizen patrol coordinator and the newsletter coordinator positions. The secretary role is currently vacant.

The third position is the newsletter coordinator who helps bundle and get newsletters delivered to designated block captains.

Board Director and Deed

Restrictions Committee Member

Mike McKann reported no new activity for the month of May besides the ongoing issue at 1306 Willard.

The downed trees and minimum setback are still a matter of concern. Chapter 42 does not address setback issue on the sides. The committee continues to work with property owners for a resolution.

Bodenhamer then had some closing announcements. A few neighbors were very pleased with Stream Energy and everyone is encouraged to sign up, as \$5 will come back to the civic association every month through a community partnership. Stream Energy rates are among the lowest available. Our annual volunteer event will be held on June 13th to honor and recognize volunteers that devote time and effort to the association.

Local realtor **Mike Spear** sponsors drinks at this event every year. There will no monthly meeting in July for a summer break and will pick back up in August. HPD Officer Alms on Local Crime

Officer Alms introduced himself to the attendees at the June 5th association meeting, as a last-minute stand-in for Officer Pate, who could not be present due to family matter. Officer Alms let everyone know that if he did not have an answer to any of their questions, he would follow up.

He proceeded to report on relevant crime statistics for 2017:

- Burglary of vehicles is up 15% from last year, 168 to 192. This crime is preventable by just removing everything out of your car whether valuable or not.
- Burglary of vehicles usually occur between 6pm and midnight.
- All other crime is down by 50%. Alms stated that he and his team specialize in solving problems in ongoing issues. He then opened the discussion for questions from the audience.

One member asked why the storefront had so many cars parked at the front. Alms explained two reasons why that is. The storefront is a workstation so there are more cars than there are officers. In addition, the Heights storefront on Shepherd closed down so they are housing all of those officers now.

Car break-ins was then addressed and specifically how HPD approaches the issue since it is hard to catch the thieves in the act. Owens said that they tend to look at trends and hot spots in the area in order to get a crime analysis and set up stings. They caught 28 car burglars in May by setting bait vehicles. The reason why it is a more prevalent issue now is because it is only a Class A misdemeanor and no longer a felony, so robbers view the opportunity as low risk and high reward.

Someone asked about the demographic of the robbers and if there are profiles of repeat offenders. Alms explained that the answer to that varies, as there is not one certain age group but some of the bank crimes involve a younger demographic. Some of the offenders are repeat offenders and are known by name.

President Bodenhamer asked how often crime statistics are available to the public, as the historical reporting has been three months out. Owens did not have an answer but promised to look into it. He said the last time he

checked, it was updated in February. Bodenhamer then asked about the ongoing issue of unoccupied houses that get taken over by squatters. They often get chased off but return within a few days. There are also squatters that hang out in Lamar Park that use electrical outlets and make it hard for maintenance to perform monthly services. Alms stated that they are aware of the Lamar Park issue and are on top of it. They know that they are not supposed to be there but it is a touchy subject now since there are very few laws that keep them off the street for more than a day. The squatters inside of the houses need to be removed by an officer as soon as they are spotted. They end up being moved out of one place and then shifting to another. He urged everyone to call the Montrose Management District Patrol (see front page of this newsletter for contact info) or the non-emergency HPD line 713-884-3131 when you notice squatters. He explained that the problem is hard to solve because some homeless individuals refuse help. A new ordinance recently passed regarding camping. Anything that can fit in a 3' by 3' box is not considered camping so if they can fit their belongings in

there, then they cannot be arrested for camping.

Vice President Chris Delphin asked if there was a way to check online if a house was vacant. Alms said HCAD will show delinquencies on taxes but he prefers to call the city to find out.

Bodenhamer asked if all officers are required to wear a camera while working and Alms said that most officers who are not rookies around the area have them. They are not constantly recording but they turn it on when they are about to take any kind of action.

One member asked if there was some sort of pattern with burglars and whom they choose to target. Owens stated that most burglars do not want confrontation, which is why they act during the day when people are at work or at night while they are asleep.

Alms closed with telling everyone, "You are our eyes are ears". He said that 80% of burglars are caught by neighbors who phone in with suspicious activity. Neighbors can easily spot things that might be out of the norm. We are a big help to HPD. Law enforcement numbers can be found on the top right corner of the front page of the Hyde Park monthly newsletters.

DID YOU KNOW?

Lamar Park was named after the 2nd President of the Republic of Texas, **Mirabeau B. Lamar**. He at one time owned this land in the 1840s. Lamar distinguished himself in the Battle of San Jacinto, immediately becoming a colonel and commander of his unit of cavalry due to the bravery he exhibited in the battle. Lamar then became vice-president of the fledgling Republic of Texas under Sam Houston and later elected the 2nd president.

Mirabeau B. Lamar was particularly known for his promotion of education. He set aside lands in each county of Texas for the construction of public schools. Many schools across the state from elementary to high school are named after him. Lamar University in Beaumont bears his name. The University of Texas and Texas A & M University are both on lands set aside for school development stemming from his term in office.

It's Not Too Late to Prepare For Hurricane Season

Hurricane season began on June 1. The following information is from the American Red Cross and the National Weather Service.

The American Red Cross advises the following:

What should I do?

- Listen to a NOAA Weather Radio for critical information from the National Weather Service (NWS).
- Check your disaster supplies and replace or restock as needed.
- Bring in anything that can be picked up by the wind (bicycles, lawn furniture).
- Close windows, doors and hurricane shutters. If you do not have hurricane shutters, close and board up all windows and doors with plywood. NWS advice states 5/8 inch exterior grade or marine plywood, built to fit, and ready to install.
- Turn off propane tanks and unplug small appliances.

5 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT GETTING YOUR HURRICANE SUPPLIES

- 1** **Food/Water** - Get supplies well in advance, enough for each person for at least one week.
- 2** **Medicine/First-aid** - Ensure you have 30 days worth of medication and supplies. Pharmacies may be closed.
- 3** **Communications** - Have extra batteries for radios and a hand crank charger for your phone.
- 4** **Gas** - Fill up your car or a gas can beforehand. If the power goes out, you will be unable to pump gas.
- 5** **Money** - Have cash on hand. With no electricity, ATMs and credit cards will not work.

For more Hurricane Safety Information, visit weather.gov/hurricanesafety

- Turn the refrigerator and freezer to the coldest setting and keep them closed as much as possible so that food will last longer if the power goes out.
- Fill your car's gas tank.
- Talk with members of your household and create an evacuation plan. Planning and practicing your evacuation plan minimizes confusion and fear during the event.
- Learn about your community's hurricane response plan. Plan routes to local shelters, register family members with special medical needs as required and make plans for your pets to be cared for.
- Evacuate if advised by authorities. Be careful to avoid flooded roads and washed out bridges.
- Because standard homeowners insurance doesn't cover flooding, it's important to have protection from the floods associated with hurricanes, tropical storms, heavy rains and other conditions that impact the U.S. For more information on flood insurance, visit the National Flood Insurance Program Web site at www.FloodSmart.gov

What supplies do I need?

- Water: at least a 3-day supply; one gallon per person per day
- Food: at least a 3-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food
- Flashlight
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible)
- Extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Medications (7-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, cane)
- Multi-purpose tool
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- Cell phone with chargers
- Family and emergency contact information
- Extra cash
- Emergency blanket
- Map(s) of the area
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl)
- Tools/supplies for securing your home
- Extra set of car keys and house keys
- Extra clothing, hat and sturdy shoes
- Rain gear
- Insect repellent and sunscreen
- Camera for photos of damage

The NWS has the following information:

Follow instructions issued by local officials. Leave immediately if ordered!

If NOT ordered to evacuate:

- Take refuge in a small interior room, closet, or hallway on the lowest level during the storm. Put as many walls between you and the outside as you can.
- Stay away from windows, skylights, and glass doors.
- If the eye of the storm passes over your area, there will be a short period of calm, but at the other side of the eye, the wind speed rapidly increases to hurricane force winds coming from the opposite direction.

What do I do after a hurricane?

American Red Cross advice is to:

- Continue listening to a NOAA Weather Radio or the local news for the latest updates.
- Stay alert for extended rainfall and subsequent flooding even after the hurricane or tropical storm has ended.
- If you evacuated, return home only when officials say it is safe.
- Drive only if necessary and avoid flooded roads and washed-out bridges.
- Keep away from loose or dangling power lines and report them immediately to the power company.
- Stay out of any building that has water around it. The NWS additionally advises to stay out of any building if you smell

gas, if the building or home was damaged by fire, or if the authorities have not declared it safe.

- Inspect your home for damage. Take pictures of damage, both of the building and its contents, for insurance purposes.
 - Use battery-powered flashlights in the dark. Do NOT use candles. The NWS further advises to turn on your flashlight before entering a vacated building. The battery could produce a spark that could ignite leaking gas, if present.
 - Avoid drinking or preparing food with tap water until you are sure it's not contaminated.
 - Check refrigerated food for spoilage. If in doubt, throw it out.
 - Wear protective clothing and be cautious when cleaning up to avoid injury.
 - Watch animals closely and keep them under your direct control.
 - Use the telephone only for emergency calls.
- The NWS has the additional advice for after a hurricane:
- Once home, drive only if necessary and avoid flooded roads and washed-out bridges. If you must go out, watch for fallen objects in the road, downed electrical wires, and weakened walls, bridges, roads, and sidewalks that might collapse.
 - Carbon monoxide poisoning is one of the leading causes of death after storms in areas dealing with power outages. Never use a portable generator inside your home or garage. Review generator safety.




