# HPCA June 2018 Meeting Minutes

The June Hyde Park Civic Association general meeting was held on Monday, June 4th, at Rudyard's Pub. **Past President Macy Bodenhamer** greeted everyone at 6:32pm. There were approximately 20 people in attendance. Bodenhamer welcomed guest speakers from **HPD Lieutenant Andy Granger, Sergeant Chad Wall, Officer Wayne Pate** and **Officer Marissa Arroyo**. **Granger** led the meeting with a presentation on how to prevent burglaries in your home and motor vehicle. The meeting then continued with the regular business agenda.

There was no treasurer's report on hand that night.

**Board Director and Deed Restrictions Committee Member Barry Baumgarten** gave a deed restrictions update in regards to the planning commission for the Corazon property.

**Membership committee co-chair Helen Zunka** announced the there was just over 100 paid members in the association. She encouraged those who hadn't signed up yet to do so right away in order to win a free cookbook. She also announced the upcoming happy hour on June 21st at El Real.

**Bodenhamer** then concluded the meeting with a couple of general announcements. There will be no monthly meeting in July. The next meeting will be held on August 6th. Suggestion for a guest speaker are welcome. She also said that the volunteer event is still being planned and everyone should stay tuned for more information. The meeting ended at 7:45pm.

## Guest Speaker Lieutenant Andy Granger



*Lt. Granger has been with the Houston Police Department for 12 years, working many different assignments. As a Patrol Officer, Lt. Granger worked at Central Patrol Division. He then went on to work at Northwest Patrol Hot Spots Unit. In that unit they conducted targeted enforcement activities in high crime areas and designated hot spots. From there Lt. Granger was promoted to Sergeant, assigned to South Central Patrol Division as a Patrol Sergeant. Lt. Granger then moved to the Training Division as a Sergeant in the In-Service Training Unit. Lt. Granger has been now promoted to Lieutenant and now serves as the Central Evening Shift Commander.*

**Lieutenant Andy Granger** gave a presentation on crime prevention. He was joined by fellow officers **Chad Wall** and **Marissa Arroyo**.

The two top crimes are burglary of motor vehicles and homes. There are burglaries reported very 15 seconds in the US. **Lt. Granger** presented some ways that we can prevent such burglaries.

## HOME BURGLARY PREVENTION

**Doors and Windows:** All exterior doors should be solid core or of metal construction. All entry doors should be equipped with a good quality deadbolt lock having a minimum of a one inch throw. A good quality double cylinder deadbolt lock should be used if there is glass within 40 inches of the lock. Use a heavy duty strike plate secured with number 12 gauge three-inch wood screws. All exit doors with outside hinges should have their hinges pinned. Install a peephole with at least a 180 degree viewing area. Secure all sliding glass doors with an anti-lifting device and a secondary locking device. Windows have latches and not locks, therefore, install secondary locking devices on all windows.

**Exterior and Landscape:** Install lights to illuminate your driveway, doors and walkways. Use inexpensive timers or photo electric cells to automatically turn the lights on and off at dusk and dawn. Trim shrubbery and trees so doors and windows are visible from the street. If there is a second floor, prune the trees so that a thief cannot use them to reach a second floor window. Plant thorny hostile plants along fences and windows to discourage an intruder. Do not leave ladders unattended or anything that can assist a person in gaining entry. Install large and reflective numbers (minimum 3 inches) on your house and mailbox so police and other emergency personnel can find your home quickly. Never leave notes that say you're not at home.

**Alarm Systems:** Choose a reputable, well established company. Do not write your alarm code on or near the alarm keypad. Put a warning sign on windows and entrances.

## CAR THEFT PREVENTION

Park only in well-lighted areas near other vehicles. Don't leave anything in the car, even if it is not valuable because burglars don't know if it's valuable or not. Everything is still an opportunity. Valuables should be locked in the trunk prior to arriving at a parking location. Lock all the doors and roll up all the windows. Use auto theft deterrents such as car alarms and kill switches. If you notice anyone acting suspicious in a parking lot, notify the business security or call the police.

## PLEASE REPORT ALL CRIMES

**Granger** stated that all crimes should be reported even if nothing was stolen so that the captain can reallocate officers to places with higher crimes and these stats can be used to follow a pattern in order to stop it. **You can report crimes online:** <http://www.houstontx.gov/police/onlinereport.htm>

He then asked the audience if they had any questions. The topic of finger prints came up and **Granger** explained that the process was not as advertised in movies as extensive testing has to take place in order to identify the correct person. If a person has never been arrested or applied for a license he/she might not be in the database so the process can take even longer. A lot of concern and frustration was voiced about the way officers are responding to crime and theft in the neighborhood. Photos of suspect are being circulated all over social media and one resident who was burglarized was told there was no proof of break-in because the photos came from a neighbors camera and not her own. Lieutenant Chad Wall stated that residents should call burglary and theft division with report numbers.

The central division number is 713-247-4400. If you call about a suspicious person, ask to speak directly to the officer so they can know the exact location. Another resident was frustrated that the officers at her home did not take any finger prints even though it was requested. In such cases, it is suggested to call in immediately and ask to speak to a supervisor and ask the officers to come back and take finger prints.

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## Interview with Local Realtor Mike Spear

As part of our ongoing interview series, local realtor and long-time Hyde Park Civic Association supporter, Mike Spear, agreed to sit down with residents Ellen Pollard and Helen Zunka. Mike tells us a little bit about his background and gives his insights into the local real estate market.

**HZ: Were you born here? Where are you from?**

**MS:** I was born in Creswell, on the coast of North Carolina, also known as "God's country".

**HZ: What brought you here?**

**MS:** I was in retail management with Kmart and was transferred here in 1984. I worked in the Houston market with Kmart for four years, then was transferred to Albuquerque NM. After a year in Albuquerque, I was home sick for Houston so a friend in Real Estate said "come back and get your license and come work for me." So I moved back, got my real estate license and went to work for Acker-Blum and Associates.

**HZ: How long have you been doing this?**

**MS:** Since 1987

**EP: Why have you been so successful here?**

**MS:** It's all about relationships and taking care of those relationships, and always being honest with my clients. Sometimes, I won't get a listing on the seller's first round on the market because my property evaluations are always honest. A lot of sellers don't want to hear what the market will support in listing their property so they go to an agent that will list higher. But you will always net more money if you price them correctly to begin with. A lot of times these sellers will come back to me to list their home when the first agent couldn't sell it at the wrong price.

**EP: What do you love about this neighborhood?**

**MS:** Everything! The coffee shops, the restaurants, the shops, Lamar Park. I absolutely LOVE walking my dogs and knowing so many of the neighbors!!

**EP: What are the job prospects for someone entering your field today?**

**MS:** There is always room for more people in the real estate world. It amazes me how some people just hit the ground running in real estate and other's just can never get their footing. It's kind of like the restaurant business where you see a lot come and go. But the ones that are willing to work hard and put in the LONG hours will make \$\$\$.

**EP: How does Hyde Park do compared with other parts of Montrose as far as resale? Anything we can do to make resale better?**

**MS:** The inner loop neighborhoods are all doing great. It seems that the neighborhoods with good deed restrictions and active civic associations such as Hyde Park, Cherryhurst, and Winlow Place tend to hold their values more.

**HZ: How do projects like Mandell Montrose affect adjacent property values?**

**MS:** Well I normally stay on the fence on these issues, but in my opinion, mid/high rise living is the wave of the future. The largest buying sector in the market are the Millennials in their late 20's and early 30's. They love this kind of product. It's like the Oldsmobile ad line "This is NOT your father's Oldsmobile". The younger generation wants to be near all the really cool shops, restaurants, and entertainment. They love to be in neighborhoods that have high "walkability scores". They do not want the same product that the Baby Boomers wanted. I predict with the increasing cost of land, in 20 years people will be saying "why did these people put all these restrictions in place? We want higher density. We want to be a more urban city." As far as neighborhood values, the close-in neighborhoods have always held their value more. Even in the 80's when the real estate market crashed, when I had just gotten into the business, the closer-in properties fell less in value and recovered quicker than suburban neighborhoods.

**HZ: How has Chapter 42 and MLS (minimum lot size) affected home prices in Hyde Park where few properties have it and in Cherryhurst where everyone has it?**

**MS:** Cherryhurst is an isolated neighborhood where minimum lot size actually works. However in Hyde Park, you have always had a huge mix of product: single family, townhomes, and multi-family, even commercial. This eclectic vibe is what made Montrose and Hyde Park what it is today. My first home that I purchased in Houston was on California Street. I purchased that house for \$95K and now that dirt alone, without the house, would be over \$600k today. The more the population grows, the more the value of the inner loop properties will be. The street congestion in Houston has become horrendous over the last 5 years. I really think we should be working more towards mass transit that services the inner city neighborhoods to downtown and other major hubs. In 2015 we had 6.4 million in the Greater

Houston metropolitan's area, by 2040 we are expected to be at 9 million people. This is according to the Greater Houston Partnership using statistics from the Texas Demographic center. Houston we are going VERTICAL!!

**HZ: What are buyers looking for? What's hot right now?**

**MS:** Low maintenance, lock and leave living.

**HZ: What are your top five tips for selling a home?**

**MS:** Price correctly from day one, clean and organize everything, de-clutter and put things in storage, have the home professional staged, call Mike Spear to get it SOLD.

**HZ: Are most properties selling at or near their asking price?**

**MS:** They are selling at or near their asking price when they are priced correctly at the start. If they're priced too high at the beginning, they are sitting on the market and getting shopworn and selling for less than they would have had they been priced correctly. I had one client that sold in 2 days. I visited with her and said your house should sell around \$475,000.00 and we should list for \$499K, she responded with NO I want it listed at \$479K and I want multiple offers at full price and to sell quickly. The exchange rate is such that I need to get my money back in the UK. She was moving back home to the UK. She got multiple offers, and sold \$5000 above asking and the purchase agreement was signed in 2 days. That's a seller that really understands.

**EP: What would you like to say to your Hyde Park neighbors?**

**MS:** Love you guys, love my neighborhood and I'll see you guys while I'm out walking my three schnauzers.

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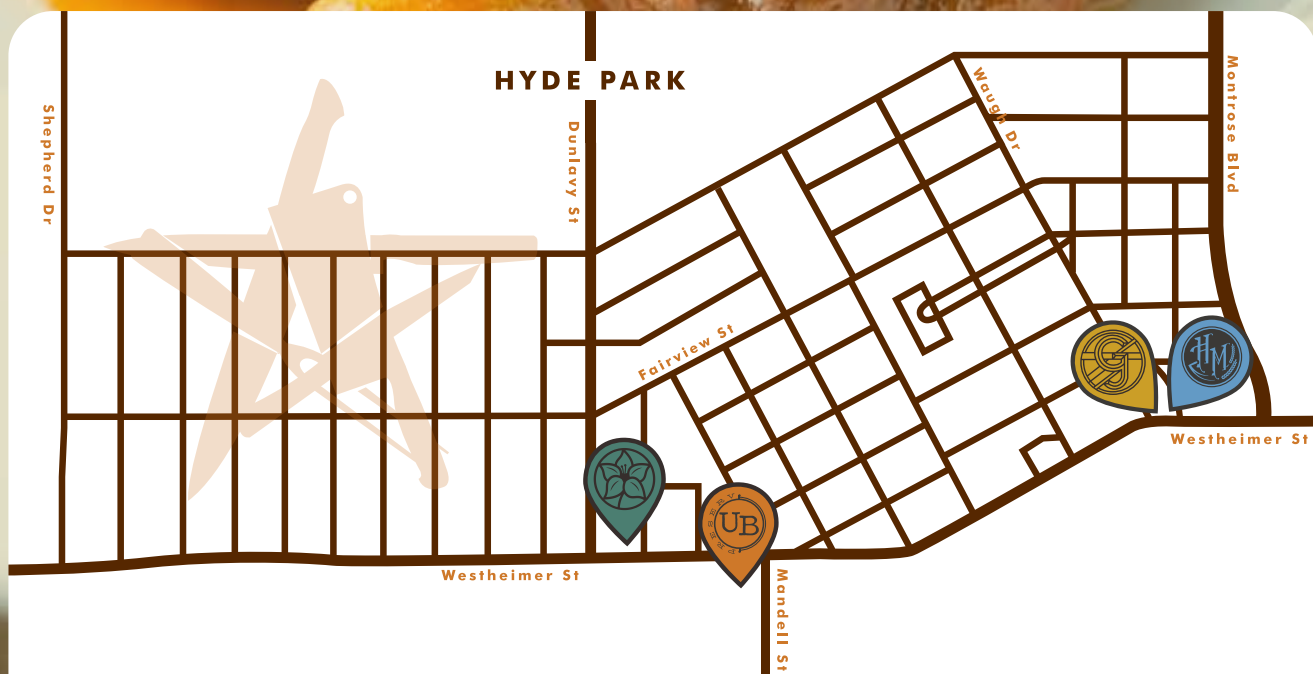
